## 1. Aims

We believe that an appropriate school uniform can play a key role in:

- promoting the ethos of our school
- providing a sense of belonging and identity
- setting an appropriate tone for education
- supporting students in accessing the curriculum and assisting with matters of health and safety

By creating a common identity amongst all pupils, regardless of background, a school uniform can act as a social leveller. It can reduce bullying and peer pressure to wear the latest fashions or other expensive clothes.

This policy aims to:

- Set out our approach to requiring a uniform that is of reasonable cost and offers the best value for money for parents and carers
- Explain how we will avoid discrimination in line with our legal duties under the Equality Act 2010
- Clarify our expectations for school uniform

## 2. Our school's legal duties under the Equality Act 2010

The Equality Act 2010 prohibits discrimination against an individual based on the protected characteristics, which include sex, race, religion or belief, and gender reassignment.

To avoid discrimination, our school will:

- Avoid listing uniform items based on sex, to give all students the opportunity to wear the uniform they feel most comfortable in or that most reflects their self-identified gender
- Make sure that our uniform costs are equitable for students
- Allow all students to have long hair (though we reserve the right to ask for this to be tied back)
- Allow all students to style their hair in the way that is appropriate for school yet makes them feel most comfortable
- Allow students to wear headscarves and other religious or cultural symbols
- Allow for adaptations to our policy on the grounds of equality by asking students or their parents to get in touch with the Headteacher or Deputy Headteacher, who can answer questions about the policy and respond to any requests

### 3. Limiting the cost of school uniform

Our school has a duty to make sure that the uniform we require is affordable, in line with statutory [guidance](#) from the Department for Education on the cost of school uniform.

We understand that items with distinctive characteristics (such as branded items, or items that have to have a school logo or a unique fabric/colour/design) cannot be purchased from a wide range of retailers and that requiring many such items limits parents' ability to 'shop around' for a low price.

**There are only four branded items that are compulsory** – a school jumper, a school tie, school shorts/skirt/trousers and PE top. These cost a maximum of £90 (this is for the largest sizes available). **Support to purchase uniform is always available where there is a need. Parents and carers can contact the relevant Pastoral Progress Lead for financial support.**

We will make sure our uniform:

- Is available at a reasonable cost
- Provides the best value for money for parents/carers

We will do this by:

- Always offering to purchase key items of uniform for a student should there be the need and signposting parents/carers to sources of additional support including the Local Authority
- Carefully considering the number of items of clothing with the school badge or school colours
- Limiting any items with distinctive characteristics where possible whilst maintaining the integrity of the overall dress code
- Limiting items with distinctive characteristics to low-cost or long-lasting items, such as ties
- Working with the school uniform provider to check for quality to ensure sustainability
- Avoiding specific requirements for items students could wear on non-school days, such as coats, bags and shoes
- Keeping the number of optional branded items to a minimum, so that the school's uniform can act as a social leveler
- Avoiding different uniform requirements for different year/class/house groups which are compulsory
- Avoiding different uniform requirements for extra-curricular activities which are compulsory
- Considering alternative methods for signaling differences in groups for interschool competitions including badges
- Making sure that arrangements are in place for parents to acquire second-hand uniform items
- Avoiding frequent changes to uniform specifications and minimising the financial impact on parents of any changes
- Consulting with parents and students on any proposed significant changes to the uniform policy and carefully considering any complaints about the policy

### 4. Expectations for school uniform

#### 4.1 Our school's uniform

We expect all students in years 7-11 to take pride in their uniform and wear correct items every day to school. If a student is not in correct uniform they will either be:





- sent home with permission from parents/carers to get changed
- lent a spare item in exchange for a valuable e.g. mobile phone

- placed in isolation for the day if they do not comply

Sixth Form students are not required to wear school uniform. Students are expected to dress smartly and set a high standard as an example to the rest of the school.


Items denoted with a \*\* are branded items which are compulsory.


Non branded items can be purchased from clothing outlets other than Monkhouse.

Uniform item	School policy	Additional information
<b>Trousers or Skirt**</b>	Skirts, shorts and trousers will be black and must have the school logo/crest on them. These can only be purchased from Monkhouse Schoolwear. <div style="text-align: center;">  </div>	Shorts are optional and can be worn all year round.  No other shorts or cropped trousers, black jeans, leggings or “skinny” trousers will be acceptable.  Tracksuit, denim, corduroy or pin-striped materials are not allowed.
<b>Shirt</b>	Plain white, long or short sleeves. Regular collar. <div style="text-align: center;">  </div>	Must be worn tucked in.
<b>Tie**</b>	School tie only. This must be worn at all times when wearing a collared shirt. <div style="text-align: center;">  </div>	Year 11 Senior Students and Sports Leaders are permitted to wear a gold crested or striped tie provided by school.  Year 10 and 11 Anti-Bullying Ambassadors are permitted to wear the blue striped tie provided by school.
<b>Jumper**</b>	V-necked, navy blue with school crest. <div style="text-align: center;">  </div>	Must be worn during terms 1-3.
<b>Tights</b>	Black or neutral tights may be worn with skirts in place of socks.	No patterned tights allowed.  Tights that are excessively ripped or damaged should be replaced.  <b>Black</b> socks worn with black tights/leggings in the colder months are permitted.
<b>Socks</b>	Plain black socks.	No markings of another colour are allowed.  Trainer socks are not permitted.
<b>Coat</b>	Sensible waterproof coat.	Hoodies and sweatshirts instead of a coat are not allowed.

<b>Shoes</b>	Shoes should be plain black, flat heeled, robust and waterproof.  Short plain black boots are acceptable.	Plain black leather or leather style trainer type shoes are allowed providing there are no logos or other colours visible and no canvas or mesh sections to the shoe.  No canvas shoes of any type.  No white flashing or logos on shoes.  No coloured laces. No excessive adornments to shoes or boots.
<b>Jewellery</b>	One wristwatch  <b>One</b> small, plain stud earring <b>per ear</b> only.  Smart watches can be worn but not used to access social media or the internet.	Rings, bracelets and necklaces are not allowed.  Nose and tongue studs are not allowed.  Clear nose studs are not allowed.  Nose studs or other piercings taped over are not permitted.  No other body piercings of any kind are permitted to be worn – they must always be removed in school.  Religious jewellery is allowed, however, please be aware it may need to be taped up, adjusted, or removed during some practical activities to ensure safety for all students.  Earrings must be removed for PE; no tape over earrings permitted.
<b>Hair</b>	Natural hair colour only.  Haircuts and hair styles should not be extreme and should conform to the Health and Safety requirement of practical lessons.	Use of hair dye to achieve an unnatural, two-toned, or bleached coloured look is not permitted.  Headscarves must be black, navy, or white.
<b>Make-up</b>	Make-up must not be visible.	False eyelashes are not permitted.
<b>Nails</b>	Nail varnish is not permitted.  Acrylic, gel and other false nails or extensions are not permitted.	Nails must be of a length that is practical and safe to take part in PE.

## PE kit

<b>Uniform item</b>	<b>School Policy</b>	<b>Additional information</b>
<b>PE shirt</b>	Navy blue crested polo shirt.**  	Long-sleeved, navy blue, plain base layer is optional.  Navy blue PE sweatshirt with the school logo is optional.  School rugby shirt is optional.
<b>PE shorts</b>	Navy blue, plain leggings or shorts.	Navy blue crested tracksuit bottoms and navy CSS leggings are <b>optional</b> .

		Leggings must be of a thick material, so they are not see-through.
<b>Trainers</b>	Trainers suitable for hard court, astro pitch and sports centre.	No plimsolls. Football boots for cross country and extra-curricular football matches are optional. Students playing on the astro pitches at break and lunchtime must have non-marking astro turf trainers.
<b>PE socks</b>	Plain, knee high navy PE socks or school branded red and blue PE socks. 	
<b>Other items</b>	Shin pads and mouth guards for hockey/rugby are highly recommended.

## 5. Expectations for our school community

### 5.1 Students

Students are expected to wear the correct uniform at all times (other than specified non-school uniform days) while:

- On the school premises
- Travelling to and from school
- At out-of-school events or on trips that are organised by the school, or where they are representing the school (if required)

Students are also expected to contact the Headteacher or Deputy Headteacher if they want to request an amendment to the uniform policy in relation to their protected characteristics.

### 5.2 Parents and carers

Parents/carers are expected to make sure their child has the correct uniform and PE kit, and that every item is:

- Clean
- Clearly labelled with the child's name
- In good condition

Parents/carers are also expected to contact the Headteacher or Deputy Headteacher, if they want to request an amendment to the uniform policy in relation to:

- Their child's protected characteristics
- The cost of the uniform

Parents/carers are expected to lodge any complaints or objections relating to the school uniform in a timely and reasonable manner.

Disputes about the cost of the school uniform will be:

- Resolved locally
- Dealt with in accordance with our school's complaints policy

The school will work closely with parents/carers to arrive at a mutually acceptable outcome.

South Gloucestershire Council provides, in exceptional circumstances, an essential school clothing grant to help parents on low incomes purchase school clothes for their child/children. ### **5.3 Staff**

Tutors will closely monitor students to make sure they are in correct uniform. They will give any students and families breaching the uniform policy the opportunity to comply, but will follow up with the relevant Pastoral Progress Lead if the situation doesn't improve.

Ongoing breaches of our uniform policy will be dealt with by the Behaviour Policy and Procedures.

In cases where it is suspected that financial hardship has resulted in a student not complying with this uniform policy, staff will take a mindful and considerate approach to resolving the situation.

### **5.4 Governors**

The Local Governing Body (LGB) will review this policy and make sure that it:

- Is appropriate for our school's context
- Is implemented fairly across the school
- Takes into account the views of parents/carers and students
- Offers a uniform that is appropriate, practical and safe for all students

The LGB will also make sure that the school's uniform supplier arrangements give the highest priority to cost and value for money, for example by re-tendering contracts at least every 5 years.
